At one time these hills echoed with the sound of paddle steamers that tied up a half mile down stream from here and exchanged their cargoes for farm produce to be shipped to Yale and other points on the river to Vancouver.



Did you know? Slahal Game - (Indian bone game)

This is the traditional guessing game used by Indian tribes in all parts of the country. The game is played with two sets of bones. One set is all



white while the other is white with a black stripe. The white stands for the female and the black for the male. In a short game, seven sticks are used, while in a long game twenty-one are used. The game is played with two teams with one person being the leader or guesser for each side. The object is to get all the sticks. This is done by guessing where the female bone is.

Fair play is an attitude, a way of thinking. It can be taught and it can be learned. Once it's learned, it can apply to every aspect of a person's life. That's why fair play is so important and that's why all of us are responsible.


The fair play philosophy becomes reality through the creation of a more ethical sport system, one that is democratic and grounded in the principles of integrity, fairness and respect.

Through sport, athletes learn about setting goals, working hard and having fun. They learn to respect their own abilities, and those of their competitors, and to value the effort of all participants, regardless of ability. When guided appropriately, athletes begin to realize that the joy of sport is as much in the effort as in the result.

Fair play

Everyone involved in sport, from parents and spectators to athletes, officials and coaches, can and should play a part in promoting fair play. And the easiest way to do this is to lead by example; to always respect the written and unwritten rules of the game. It is also essential to learn how to constructively manage stress so that fair play skills and instincts will not be lost in the heat of competition.

Lost Child: Report to any Sports Tent, they will radio to MC to announce immediately.

Child Left Behind: MC to announce and ask child to report to Info. Booth.

Lost and Found: Located at the Information Tent located between Field 1 and the Main Concession.

Dial 911: For any medical emergency, domestic/assault, or fire.


Emergency Vehicle Access Routes:
